

The earth is around 4,500,000,000 (4.5 billion) years old. We can't possibly know exactly how old, so we wouldn't know when to start counting from.

The system we use has no zero. It works forwards from 1AD (AD) and backwards from 1BC (BC).

BC stands for 'Before Christ' and AD stands for 'Anno Domini' (the year of the lord).
Some people use BCE and CE instead of AD and BC.



It's hard to get your head round, but our written history in Britain began only a tiny blip in time ago, courtesy of the Romans in AD43!

Telling stories, leaving messages, purely for fun or for a religious purpose? No one knows.

7,000 BC

Pottery is made in China.

120,000 BC

'Neanderthals' were a type of 'Homo sapien' (wise man).

They were the first early humans to bury their dead.

650,000 BC

Early humans started to use hand axes.

2,500,000 BC

In Africa, apes had begun to stand upright and learn new skills to survive their changing environment. They turned into the earliest ancestors of humans.

1,600,000 BC

'Homo erectus' appeared. They were skilful hunters and killed animals to eat. They used spears.

2,000,000 BC

The first real humans appeared, 'Homo habilis', which means 'handy man'. They used simple stone tools and built shelters.

3,000 BC

The first part of Stonehenge is built. Other less famous circles are built in Yorkshire, Orkney and Cumbria.

The last glacial period in Britain, commonly known as 'The Ice Age' comes to an end. This is now the Mesolithic period of the Stone Age.

12,000 BC

The earliest humans that are direct ancestors of some of the current population arrive in Britain.

4,000 BC

Farming begins and crops such as barley and wheat are grown.

4,000 BC

Travel is revolutionised when people start to ride horses instead of walking.

6,000 BC

Britain is cut off from the continent by rising sea levels.

250,000 BC

People begin to live in the entrance to caves. A group of stone age hunters were discovered in Pontnewydd Cave in Denbighshire, North Wales.

12,000 BC

No more woolly mammoths in Britain. This was possibly due to grassland turning into forest with the changing climate.

35,000 BC

'Homo sapiens sapiens' (wise-wise man) arrive in Europe and Neanderthals die out. The first European Early Humans (sometimes referred to as 'Cro-Magnons') come to Britain.

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

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



When was the Stone Age?

The Stone Age covers a huge period of time, over 3 million years!

The Stone Age starts from when the first human like animals came into existence. The earliest evidence has been found in Africa.

Early humans arrived in Britain more than 800,000 years ago but Britain has not been constantly lived in since that time due to climate changes.

The ice and the cold temperatures during the last period of time known as the Ice Age meant that early humans left Britain in search of warmer climates.

At this time Britain was not an island so they could walk across the land into Europe and Africa.

Why is it called the Stone Age?

The Stone Age is so called because the earliest humans used stone to make tools with a sharp edge or point.

Stone was the material predominantly used for tools throughout the Stone Age.



Which countries were populated?

Today there are over seven billion people in the world (7,000,000,000). Even at the peak of the stone age it was likely that there were less than five million (5,000,000).

About 2 million years ago *Homo habilis* appeared in eastern Africa.



Which countries were populated?

It wasn't until around 10,000 BC that early humans reached North and South America via the Bering land bridge that at that time connected Siberia and North America.



What type of houses did they live in?

This depended on the time, and the country.

In Britain, archaeologists have found evidence of four different types of dwelling.



What clothes did they wear?

People wore animal skins to keep them warm, sewn together using bone needles.



The fine bone needles that have been found were probably used for embroidery as well. The bodies of a boy and a girl buried around 28,000 years ago in Russia were found with thousands of ivory beads and fox teeth covering them, work that would have taken years to complete.

We also know that people were weaving fabric back then (which could have been used for clothes) and dying spun plant fibres different colours, so maybe fashion started a lot earlier than you might think!
